### Who Were The Generals? —Part 2

## MEMORY VERSE:

Talk to your child about the different skills and abilities each of the Generals had to offer. Help them identify skills and abilities they can use to share God's love with others.



**TODAY IN JUNIOR SOLDIERS,** the children learned about the 11th through the 19th Generals of The Salvation Army. The High Council elected each of the Generals discussed today.

There were more "firsts" in Generals discussed today. General Eva Burrows, the 13th General, was the first General asked to extend her term. She served three years longer than her original term. General Paul A. Rader, the 15th General, was the first American-born General.

The Generals discussed this week also made great contributions to The Salvation Army. General Arnold Brown helped institute music camps in Canada. General Eva Burrows outlined six goals for The Salvation Army called her "Agenda for the Future" to help Salvationists focus on important issues facing The Salvation Army. General Paul A. Rader held the International Youth Forum to listen to what young Salvationists from around the world think about The Salvation Army. General John Gowans, the 16th General, together with General John Larsson, penned ten musicals published and performed in The Salvation Army. General Shaw Clifton worked actively against human trafficking and established an international social justice commission based in New York. He was also a strong believer in the equality of men and women and consistently sought to promote women leaders into prominent roles. General Linda Bond was the third woman and the fourth Canadian to be General. General Bond received an honorary degree from Tyndale University College and Seminary. On June 13, 2013, she unexpectedly announced her retirement, effective immediately.

The men and women elected as Generals of The Salvation Army have used their God-given skills, gifts, and abilities to further His work. Each man and woman contributed greatly to the advancement of God's Kingdom, and the mission of The Salvation Army.

## INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOME

This lesson provided junior soldiers with basic biographical information on nine of the ten remaining Generals elected by the High Council. They learned about the contributions made by these men and women not only to The Salvation Army, but also to the world at-large.
